National Garden Scheme

Only a small percentage of the population is aware of the amazing contributions this organisation has donated to nursing and health charities. The concept is quite simple - owners of quality gardens, be they large or small, agree to open their gardens, through the National Garden Scheme, to the public on specific days or by arrangement. For this privilege, visitors pay a modest entrance fee. All entrance money is donated to the National Garden Scheme. Most owners offer homemade cakes and tea/coffee and many sell plants.

All the money raised throughout England & Wales is distributed to selected nursing & health charities. Macmillan Cancer Support & MS Society, to name a couple. All those charities supported can be viewed at ngs.org.uk/beneficiaries.

In 2017 the National Garden Scheme donated a record £3.1 million to these charities. In the last 4 years Hampshire has raised a record £200,000 per year. We are very proud of this achievement, and would ask that the people of Hampshire, and Chineham in particular, keep an eye out for the Yellow NGS County Booklet, available at most garden centres and outlets in the towns and villages, or visit the web site ngs.org.uk to see which gardens are open close to you - or maybe further afield. Our 2019 season commences in February with the Snowdrop Festival.

Probus Club

We recently enjoyed an excellent evening out at the Mill theatre at Sonning. As it was dark, the views of the attractive old buildings were limited, but inside there is a very cosy bar and upstairs dining area, from which there is easy access into the auditorium. The building dates from the 1700s and 1800s, but there is a mention of mills at Sonning in the Domesday Book. It closed as a flour mill in 1969, and was purchased and converted by the Richards family reopening it as a theatre/restaurant in 1982.

The evening started with a drink followed by an excellent buffet-style meal before the performance. The production was *A Night in Provence*; a comedy about an English couple who have booked a luxury villa for a 2-week summer holiday, only to find that there has been a mix-up by the agents who had not told the owners about the booking. The trouble—or entertainment—starts when the owners arrive from Paris expecting to use the villa for their own holiday. Shortly afterwards the English couple's Irish friends turn up as well. They decide that they will share the villa, and the play is about the stresses and strains that this causes – a heady mixture of champagne, attraction, and cultural differences. The play was well cast, performed enthusiastically and with good comic timing. This is just as well, as the “stage” is effectively a pit, with the audience in a semi-circle looking down on them, rather like a classical Roman or Greek theatre.

Nature Notes

November along with July are regarded as the wettest months of the year, although most of the rain came at the start of December. Normally, I would have put covers over the flower beds, but I was busy emptying the saucers under the pots every day to prevent the plants rotting. I did not have time to move any worms that had sheltered underneath. I saw four bumble bees on flowers until 20th November.

As the original hedgehog house took so long to arrive, I ordered another one, which arrived the next day. Despite erecting it immediately, I hope it wasn't too late. I am not going to check inside. Are you aware that the hedgehogs in Chineham are learning the Highway Code? Chris drove onto Thornhill Way from Mattock Way so that he was going slow enough to spot a hedgehog traversing the new zebra crossing on his side of the road. Chris stopped and the hedgehog continued to the centre, where it remained stationary (as per the Highway Code). A car halted on the other side, whereupon the cautious traveller continued on its journey across the stripes to reach the pavement by the post box. A small animal had such an impact that two lanes of traffic obeyed The Highway Code instinctively.

In an old book, I came upon the information that in 1970 there were only 20 pairs of red kites, and those in Wales, so we are lucky now as we look up at the lovely colour of those graceful birds. How easy for animals and plants to become extinct. I worry that I don't have the chaffinches that filled my garden twenty years ago, but

then I talk to someone in another part of Chineham, and they tell me that they have those but no house sparrows. So, now we have this communication, please carry it further and participate in schemes like The Garden Bird Watch. This will take place in January, before the next edition of the Chineham Chat.

Talking of sparrows, they have returned to splashing in the water feature, in addition to eating masses of suet pellets every day. They have been joined by the starlings, who bully the smaller birds. I have had to add another feeder, but I have been informed by Chris, that a squirrel has joined the groups in the early mornings, which accounts for the times that the feeders have been found on the ground. Basingstoke Camera Club

Basingstoke Camera Club is a long-established club for local people interested in photography with a membership of around 80 members. The club welcomes people regardless of the equipment that they use to take photographs or the subjects that they like to photograph. Some members are particularly interested in nature photography whilst others like landscapes or portraits, many though take a broad range of subjects.

Many members will use Digital Single Lens Reflex cameras (so-called DSLRs) but others will use compact cameras or even take photos with their mobile phones. More recently some members have even gone "retro" practising their skills by taking photographs with cameras using black and white film and developing and printing them themselves. The club meets regularly on Thursday nights at the Oakridge West Community centre from September to May and then out and about around Basingstoke in the summer months. Meetings include a diverse programme of activities ranging from practical evenings, talks and lectures plus club competitions both internally and with other clubs. Exhibitions of the members work can be seen at the annual exhibition held in the Basingstoke Discovery Centre every year. This exhibition continues a tradition of club work being exhibited in the town with Hampshire records citing a club exhibition in Basingstoke as early as 1956. The club also runs a major online competition every year with thousands of entries from across the UK, profits from this online competition have enabled the club to make significant donations to St Michael's Hospice. Members also provide

a range of photographs to the Hospice to decorate the building.

County and Borough Councillor Elaine Still

There are changes this month to the bus services in Chineham. Regarding the main number 7 service, from 6 January, the Monday to Friday daytime frequency is reduced from every 15 minutes to every 20 minutes and the school day variations removed. There is no change to the frequency at weekends. The last bus on Sundays will be 45 minutes later than now.

The 7 was not part of the County Council's recent review as weekday daytime services are operated commercially with Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council support for evening and Sunday services.

The number 14, which also serves Chineham, is a service supported by Hampshire County Council. It is one of the most costly services to support as it serves many rural communities in north Hampshire. After extensive user consultations we have retained a Monday to Saturday service with key journeys at similar times to the current timetable. However the service during the day will be every 2 hours instead of hourly.

We have each chosen our favourite poem and are learning to perform them to the rest of the class making them sound interesting. In maths we have been learning about £ and pence. Minister's Message

I hope you've been well over Christmas, and have had been able to relax and have joyful times with friends and family.

We've witnessed extraordinary and turbulent times in the last few months, haven't we? I'm writing this in the middle of December, and our Prime Minister has just delayed the long-awaited 'Meaningful Vote' on Brexit in Parliament. No-one currently knows how long the delay will be, or why she thinks there's any meaningful chance of a change of position in the EU in the meantime. It's anyone's guess now whether the current deal, no deal, or even no Brexit at all, is most likely.

Whatever the outcome, we will still be left with the massive challenges of poverty, homelessness, debt, pensions, food banks, poor health among too many people, challenges in education when children come to school hungry, and so on. We must move on to face the challenges of the NHS, castrated local authorities, transport failures, infrastructure and other consequences of a decade of austerity. The EU is a long way from being perfect, but it cannot be blamed for all that.

My biggest concern with Brexit has always been that most of the time and energy available to improve the world and society we live in - the job of politics - would be almost entirely consumed for 2 years by negotiating our exit. Now the 2 years is stretching into 4 or 5. We can learn to find our way outside the EU, but future generations may hold us most accountable for the years we forgot about the more important things, distracted by leaving a club that (we've just discovered) costs us less each year

than we spent on supporting Northern Ireland.

We've also lost much of our ability to disagree agreeably. Yes, of course passions have run very high. However, the lies told, and the inability to see shades of grey but only black and white, have damaged us as a nation. Internet message boards and twitter streams are full of hatred, as people post first, and worry about the facts later. Our teenagers have watched all this, and learned that this is normal. Shame on us.

Healing the wounds and hurts is not going to be easy. But it is necessary. If we can do it around us here in Chineham, with the friends that we like, as well as those who voted differently, then we stand a chance of doing it as a nation. All-Out Borough Council Elections Delayed

Major changes to Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, scheduled for next year, are being delayed after an administrative error by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England during the consultation on new wards. The number of councillors was set to reduce from 60 to 54 after redrawing the ward boundaries as part of the commission's electoral review of the borough. This would have meant all-out council elections in May 2019.

The commission has now announced that: "Shortly before the scheduled publication of its final recommendations, the commission became aware that, due an administrative error, two submissions made during public consultation had not been made available to it during its consideration of final proposals.

"Given the importance of considering every local voice fairly and equally, the commission has decided to take a fresh look at every submission made during public consultation on the review. After taking into account all the submissions, the commission will decide the final recommendations."

The commission has decided to delay the publication of final recommendations for new electoral arrangements for Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council until 5 March 2019, with the new ward boundaries now set to come into effect at all-out elections in May 2020.

This means that voters will be going to the polls in May next year only for the wards that would have been up

for election under the current 'thirds' cycle, where 20 councillors are elected a year over three years. These wards are: Basing; Baughurst and Tadley North; Bramley and Sherfield; Brighton Hill North; Burghclere, Highclere and St Mary Bourne; Chineham; Eastrop; Grove; Hatch Warren and Beggarwood; Kempshott; Kingsclere; Norden; Oakley and North Waltham; Overton, Laverstoke and Steventon; Pamber and Silchester; South Ham; Tadley Central; Tadley South; Upton Grey and The Candovers and Winklebury.

Returning Officer for elections at the borough council Mel Barrett said: "As a result of the announcement by the commission, the borough will not be holding an all-out election in May 2019 and will revert to the scheduled cycle of elections for one third of the council next year. We prepared for new wards to come into effect in 2019. However, we have also been planning in parallel in case it was not possible for the Parliamentary order to be made in time to hold the all-out elections, so we are fully prepared for next May."

The aim of the electoral review is to recommend ward boundaries that mean each councillor represents approximately the same number of voters. It also aims to ensure that the pattern of wards reflects the interests and identities of local communities as well as promoting effective local government. How do you like to celebrate the New Year? The Spanish celebrate La Nochevieja by eating a grape with every clock bell's chime – 12 grapes in 12 seconds. Sound easy? Try it and you might change your mind! The tradition dates back to the early 1900s and it is believed that those who manage to eat all twelve grapes at the right time will have twelve joyful months in the coming year. The fun and festive food don't end on 1st, since "La Epifanía/El Día de los Reyes Magos" is also an important celebration, commemorating the three kings bearing gifts for baby Jesus.

On 5th January, huge parades or 'cabalgatas' are held around Spain and broadcast on television. One of the biggest in Madrid draws crowds of over 100,000, including thousands of children eager to catch the sweets thrown into the crowd by the three kings. On the evening of 5th January, children leave out their polished shoes and some sweets, wine and milk for the kings and their animal transportation. The next morning, their shoes and the house will be full of presents. Indeed, for many families, it'll be the 6th January when gifts are exchanged instead of, or in addition to, 25th December. Families will eat a "Roscón de Reyes", a ring-shaped sweet bread, covered with candied fruits. Hidden inside the Roscón is a figurine and a dried bean. Whoever ends up finding the figurine becomes "king" or "queen" for the day and whoever finds the bean is supposed to buy next year's Roscón!

Although it wasn't us who found the bean in the Roscón last year, we hope to be offering Roscón to our Spanish groups when we start up again on **Monday 7th January**. ¡Feliz Año Nuevo!
