Mixed Plastic Recycling News

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council's Cabinet Member for Regulatory Services and the Environment Cllr Hayley Eachus said: "There has been a drop in the market for recycling mixed plastics making it unviable for the company providing mixed plastic bring banks in the borough to sell on the material for recycling. This is a national issue affecting other local authorities around the country. It is important that the items we collect at these banks are being recycled or, if this is not possible, then the most efficient and environmentally friendly method of disposal used. To guarantee this we have decided, for the moment, to close the plastic recycling banks from Thursday 18 October while we work with Hampshire County Council to look for markets for this material.

I would like to encourage residents to continue to recycle clean plastic bottles including drink bottles, shampoo and bleach bottles in their kerbside green bin and place all other plastics in their grey waste bin. This will be sent to the Energy Recovery Facility (ERF) to produce electricity which is fed back to the national grid and is still the best option, environmentally, for non-recyclable waste."

Probus Club

The man behind such world famous products, Frank Hornby, was the subject of a talk given by John Hollands to the Probus Club of Basingstoke.

Born in 1863, Frank Hornby was the 7th of 8 children. Liverpool was his lifelong home, ending as Conservative MP for Everton. He started as a cashier and having realised that perseverance was the key to success founded a branch of the Band of Hope around 1900. This was a temperance organisation with several million members throughout the country.

He wanted boys to take up useful trades and started to develop a construction kit which he patented in 1901. Initially called Mechanics Made Easy the name changed to Meccano in 1907 and around this time it was exported to over 40 countries. It had initially been plain metal then painted red and green then blue and yellow. Instructional monthly Meccano magazines became required reading.

The famous Binns Road factory in Liverpool was opened in 1914 employing up to 2000 people, mainly women. After WW1, Hornby introduced model trains to compete against resurgent German toy manufacturers. The engines were driven by clockwork motors and then by 1925 mains electricity. Export markets had decals on the trucks and passenger coaches pertinent to their own countries. The factory started to make model figures and equipment to complement the train sets. They were called Dinky Toys. Road vehicles were added to add authenticity to the layouts and thus began the third string of this toy manufacturer which continued up to the closure of the company in 1978. Today Dinky Toys, especially with original boxes, command extraordinary prices at auction.

Nature Notes

I have received many messages concerning hedgehogs around Chineham, which is great news. Helen sent me an article warning us not to feed meal worms to hedgehogs, as their bones can be affected. Thank you Helen. Elizabeth in Reading Road has had five babies eating from one dish, which is fantastic. Remember that any small ones (approximately 500 grams) should be taken to a vet or sanctuary when the nights begin to feel really cold. (I cut up a piece of cheese that size to give me an idea!) I have to purchase a new winter home to leave at the end of the garden. I hope the one chosen from RSPB has a large enough entrance, because the hedgehogs visiting my house are now very large. Perhaps I should check with the experts. Will let you know.

The birds have returned after spending their summer in the meadows, with approximately ten house sparrows announcing their arrival with loud choruses from the hedges. They have been joined by a pair of blue tits and several blackbirds. Although they are a pest to the farmer, the wood pigeons, who have a later breeding season, are not bothering me much, except when one takes off from the awning and whizzes past my ear.

One morning, Julia and I were amazed to witness hundreds of rooks flying east across the house. Normally I count only a hundred at most, in late afternoon going to the rookery near Crondall, which they have done for hundreds of years. Despite the fact that there were a lot of stragglers, we came to the conclusion it was a

migratory flight, with a bird book confirming this later.

I saw lots of teasels on the side of the A33 as I travelled along one day, but was annoyed to find them cut down the next day. I was going to scatter the seeds along the roads in Chineham to pick up some of the pollution. It was difficult to find any in the end, although if I had walked along the verge between the red men roundabout and the Tesco one, I gather I would have been luckier. Might try it another time if I wear a high vis jacket.

I was idly watching the road at the top of Mattock Way, when I spotted a squirrel dart across the road and back in front of a car. It waited until the car had passed, then crossed again. I saw it again several days later, but was astonished when it cut across in front of my car two weeks later. It survived!

There are berries on many of my bushes, including the firethorn, which is now 15 feet high. The ivy is starting to blossom, but as there isn't much, I bought several heleniums with masses of yellow flowers that are supposed to be ideal for the bees. That Russian vine further up the road has increased in length and is still in full blossom. I must ask the owner if I may have some cuttings before it is cut down, as it would supplement the plants growing along my fence. I haven't managed to buy it anywhere.

Please keep feeding the hedgehogs and don't light bonfires without checking for them.

County and Borough Councillor Elaine Still

I have received some calls regarding the plans for the Chineham District Centre, mainly concerned about the parking but generally positive and excited. I have similar feelings. Good access (inc. pedestrian) and parking are essential and I have asked questions of Tellon Capital on the issues during and after construction. Re parking: the current plan is to leave the south car park (nearest Tesco) much as it is, and to build a new car park that links to the existing north west car park (nearest Boots/Matalan) which means a net gain of 100 spaces. Part of this new car park will be underground. The access plan is for the cars to come off the existing roundabout and enter into the new underground car park. They could then drive up onto ground level and the current car park access to Matalan would become exit only.

Over 280 people attended the second public exhibition on 27 Sep. I am told that 83% of those who attended expressed support for the plans, with further helpful and constructive suggestions received. Tellon have assured me that where possible they will seek to incorporate the feedback received into their final plans. They intend to submit a planning application to the Borough Council in autumn 2018 and will keep all interested parties informed as the project progresses.

The month of November brings the BDBC closer to the conclusion of the reorganisation of the Wards and reducing the total number of Councillors by 10%. The details of the new Ward boundaries and the new names for some of them, will be published on the Council website later this month as soon as the Boundary Commission release their decision. As far as Chineham is concerned, neither our boundary nor the number of Councillors representing you should change as the criteria set by the Commission is met almost exactly by the Chineham Ward as it is today.

Residents should see fairly rapid progress in the planning process for the redevelopment of the Chineham District Centre and I wish to thank everyone who has contributed to the public consultation events and their written inputs to the owners of the Centre, Tellon. There will be further opportunities to provide comments and observations on the proposed details of the Planning Application as soon as it is published by BDBC, anticipated before the end of this year. As far as I understand it, the redevelopment is planned in two phases, early spring to late autumn 2019 then early 2020 to complete before Christmas that year. It is envisaged that high number of business that are remaining during these works will be capable of continuous trading during this time.

Four Lanes Infant School

Year 2 have been learning to write exciting stories about the Three Little Pigs and Red Riding Hood, adding interesting words to describe the characters or objects in the story. We even wrote our own wanted posters to catch the Big Bad Wolf and we have learnt about exclamatory sentences! We have been practising joining our writing too. We had to sort out the library books for Mrs Vaughan (while she is away in Brazil helping to build houses) we had to sort them into fiction and non-fiction books. We looked at what was the same – they both have words and pictures and what was different. Non-fiction books are interesting and are real facts. Fiction books are also interesting but are not real, made up and are stories or poems. Non-fiction books often have a contents or index page and you can read them in any order. Non-fiction books have lots of titles, fiction books often have chapters.

Year 1 went on an autumn walk to help them to write exciting autumn poems and information all about what they know about autumn. They have been starting to make a self-portrait using textures and lines in the style of Picasso. In maths they have been learning about place value, finding one more and one less and using the ‘part-part-whole’ model ready for doing addition. (A part-part-whole model shows how the whole number can be split up into two parts which equal the whole.)

Year R have also been learning about autumn. They went on their autumn walk to spot changes outside and

collected leaves, twigs, conkers and other autumn objects and they took lots of photos. They have been learning about numbers, and learning about what 1, 2 and 3 represent, finding the right number of objects to match the number, finding one more and playing games with the numbers 2 and 3 like pairs and noughts and crosses. They have been learning the phonic sounds and have learnt the songs and cued articulation signs to go with them. They have had fun using maths and writing outside in the playground.

Civil Service Retirement Fellowship

50 members attended the meeting on 3rd October. Tony Brazier, the Secretary, gave a reminder of the forthcoming Mystery Trip in October, the trip to Basildon Park (which would include lunch in Theale) on Thursday 22 November and the Christmas Lunch at BCOT on Thursday 13 December.

The speaker this month was Malcolm Nelson who had worked for 40 years as a customs officer mainly at Heathrow airport. He explained that it was a particularly important airport to those who wanted to smuggle drugs into the country as it was not only easy to reach from most places abroad but was then conveniently close to London. In fact 80% of the illegal drugs found came in through Heathrow. He then went on to give an outline of the considerations taken into account by customs officers when a number of planes would land within a few minutes each with about 450 passengers taking just 20–30 minutes to pass through the “Green Channel”. He gave a number of examples of their procedures which ensured that they were able to target the people thought most likely to be smuggling illicit contraband into the country and the big part taken by their specialist dog teams in this process.

Malcolm also brought along copies of his books “Forty Years Catching Smugglers” and “In Pursuit of the Two Legged Mule”

The next meeting is on **7th November** when the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service are coming to give a talk on Fire Safety at Home. Also at this meeting there will be a Christmas themed “Bring

and Buy Sale” to raise further funds towards the new sound system. This is going to be a short message this month to discuss staffing. The Neighbourhood Policing Team for Basingstoke is headed by an Inspector and two Sergeants. Chineham has one Police Constable and myself, but further to this we are now delighted to welcome PCSO Charlotte Moring to the team. She will be working alongside me in our community and can be contacted via 101 or by email at charlotte-emily.moring@hampshire.pnn.police.uk. We will of course keep you updated with any changes that happen from here on. There are Council Community Safety Patrol Officers too that work to help keep people safe and disrupt anti-social behaviour.

I am glad to say that we have received a lot of support from members of public in investigating crime. A great part of that is CCTV footage that people have sent us relating to criminals attempting to gain

entry to vehicles. In one case, this was relatively late in the morning (5am) rather than the more usual time of about 1-2am.

Within the Neighbourhood Policing Team it is looking likely that more officers will be designated to combat drug related crime, including crime that supports drug supply i.e. theft, vehicle crime etc. PCSOs actively support this work by gathering intelligence and helping to build a picture of crime patterns, so please continue to call or email us if you have any questions or concerns.

Everything is now looking much more like winter is approaching. With it being fireworks season, the first thing we wanted to share was some advice on how to make

things easier for what can be a frightening time for some animals. For indoor pets like cats and dogs, having somewhere to hide can be a help to them; for example, under furniture or in a cupboard. Try to make sure they have access to their safe hiding place at all times if possible. Dogs like having a play area with all their favourite toys to help them relax. You can try to help by ignoring the fireworks yourself and playing with their toys to see if they want to join you, and if they have a doggy friend that isn't afraid of fireworks then keeping them together may help comfort them. Frightened cats will likely want to be left alone; if they do hide then trying to tempt them out may be more stressful for them. Of course, if any of your pets do want comforting then it's perfectly fine to give them cuddles! If you have a pet that is particularly afraid of fireworks, there is help available for them. Speak to your vet who can offer advice and refer you to an animal behaviourist if necessary.

Bonfires are also another signature of a crisp autumn day or evening, though bear in mind that what looks to you like a pile of leaves ready for burning might look like a nice hibernation spot for a hedgehog. If possible, rebuild your bonfire before lighting and always be sure to check it thoroughly before you do light it.
